Membership Meeting, 8/15/00: Commodore called meeting to order at 7:05PM. 44 members and guests in attendance. Commodore mentioned the upcoming busy weekend. Antique and Classic boat show in Red Wing on Saturday and Sunday and our own Lighthouse Night on Sunday. He passed around sign-up sheet for Red Wing show. He expects that we will have two tents and eight tables to fill up with boats. J. Bishop spoke about Lighthouse event. T.Smalley mentioned that Ships 'n Things in Manville, N.J. now has the Robbe, F-14, twin throttle FM radio available on 75mHz. The basic 4 channel transmitter, receiver, three servo unit is about \$300.

Commodore announced that the Centrum has been tentatively rented on the evening of November 11th, the date previously set for the Dry Dock Party. Possible alternate dates are Friday, Nov. 10th or 17th. He'll let us know when a date is firm. Dick Dahlquist displayed his single motor, twin drive gearboxes. They're available on either 3" or 4" centers and in a variety of ratios and cost about \$125. Dick also showed and highly recommended 3M's "Wetordry" Polishing Papers. They are available in six grades ranging from 30 micron (400 grit), through 9 micron (1200 grit), down to 1 micron.



Splash!: Doug Person passed along this interesting photograph showing the launching of the USS Peto (SS-265) at Manitowoc Shipbuilding in Wisconsin in 1942. The caption states that Peto is "The first to be built and side-launched on the Great Lakes for the U.S.Navy." Peto's, keel was laid in June 1941, while the last boat (Mero SS-378) was not commissioned until four years later.

It is interesting to note that of the 288 United States submarines that saw service during World War II, 28 were built in Manitowoc, 700 miles from the nearest ocean and over 1,800 miles (as the crow flies) from the Pacific, where 25 eventually saw action.

The 25 Wisconsin boats sank 132 Japanese ships totaling over 488,000 tons. Four were themselves, sunk by the Japanese.

USS Cobia (SS-245), not one of the twenty-eight, serves as a memorial to these vessels at the Wisconsin Maritime Museum in Manitowoc. She's open for tours, and is certainly worth a visit.

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Goin' Around, Comin' Around: Five years ago, the following article appeared in the newsletter as a suggested "rules of the road" for boating at Centennial Lakes. Our Commodore has suggested that with the extensive growth of the club, and a corresponding outbreak of what appears to be an almost complete disregard for other members, and their boats...that it be reprinted. If you notice others removing their boats from the pond as soon as you launch yours...please reexamine your operating habits!

Manners, Manners, Manners!!

(As a result of a recent accident at the lake, several members have suggested that a list of rules be developed for the pond.)

With the arrival of many uninitiated new members and a laxity on the part of some veterans, radio usage and boat operation at the pond has become somewhat careless, possibly dangerous. Several items need to be addressed and should apply to all users at Centennial Lakes, club members and non-members alike:

- •1 Only approved 'ground' frequencies are to be used. There are six 27 Mhz and thirty 75 Mhz channels (61 through 90) available for surface users. Eighteen additional channels on 50 and 53 Mhz are reserved for licensed ham radio operators only. No aircraft band (72 Mhz) transmission is permitted.
- 2 Transmitter frequencies must be identified. All radios come from the manufacturer with 1.5 inch high, black on white numerical placards or flags which attach to the transmitter antenna. These flags must be displayed. Paper substitutes, which are difficult to read, have proven to be unacceptable. Replacement flags are available at hobby shops for less than four dollars. Buy one and use it, or you may not operate at this location. (27 Mhz transmitters are required to display an additional, colored streamer)
- 3 Priority. Members of the Edina Model Yacht Club, a city chartered club, have priority over non-members at Centennial Lakes. Non-members will only be allowed to operate with the consent of members.
- 4 Sharing frequencies / Frequency conflicts. Radio crystals can be changed to avoid conflicts, however a member can not be required to do so since the crystal swap can result in a transmitter which is not optimally tuned. Note that transmitter identification flags must also be changed if crystals are changed. Two or more members on the same frequency must share operating time equally.
- •5 Common sense shall prevail. Although modern radios are fine pieces of equipment, they are not perfect. A transmitter or group of transmitters much closer to your boat's receiver than you are, can easily overpower your transmitted signal and cause loss of control. A fast electric boat being operated from the vicinity of the Centrum Building and running at the south end of the pond while several sailboat operators are broadcasting near the south buoy, is an accident waiting to happen.
- 6 Allow a line of sight. Give fellow boaters a clear view. Do not walk in front of other operators who are seated or standing along the edge of the pond. Safety and good manners dictate that the user who finds it necessary to stroll along with his or her boat should pass behind other boaters.
- 7 People first. It is not uncommon to see children sitting on the edge of the pond with their feet dangling in the water. Do not operate anywhere near these little folks...especially with a fast electric. Run into the wall, crash onto the rocks, sink a buddy's boat but do not, under any circumstances, ever come anywhere near hitting a spectator. Nothing will get us expelled from the park quicker! Additionally, do not harass the local wildfowl!
- 8 Keep clear of traffic. Operators of expensive models can become excitable. Fast electrics may be perceived as unguided missiles. Freeway drivers are cautioned to maintain a one car length following distance for every ten miles per hour of speed. Use similar figures for your power boat. While a tug can safely pull up alongside another boat, a fast moving electric may need to maintain a twenty or thirty foot spacing close in and even more at a distance where depth perception becomes questionable. Prudence is the key.
- 9 Take responsibility for your actions. Unfortunately, accidents do happen. If, as a result of carelessness or equipment failure, you cause loss or damage, step forward, make your apologies and offer to repair or replace the damaged equipment to the best of your ability.
- 10 Act responsibly. That, most of all, will preclude the necessity of further burdensome regulations. Rules only become necessary when people stop using good manners. It has been suggested that posting a list of "Rules of the Pond" on the Centrum bulletin board might be of value to members and non-members alike and serve to avoid future conflict.
