Going!,Going!...: The latest issue of Waterlines, the Seattle MYC newsletter states, "Longtime brass fitting supplier A. J. Fisher will accept orders until April 30, 2001, and then will close its doors. The business has not been picked up by new management." That's bad news, Fisher has been a good source for the last half century.

Input: Since I have received little from the membership this month, you're going to be stuck with my report on the Toledo show. Note that the newsletter is printed two weekends prior to the monthly meeting so that it may be mailed seven days in advance. Please honor that deadline since this is a one man operation. And, a one finger typist at that!

Holy Toledo!: Over the past week, I took the opportunity to give my new PT Cruiser a road test, visit my son and his family in Akron, Ohio and to attend, what is no doubt, the largest radio control show in the nation. The Toledo R/C Expo has been run by the Weak Signals R/C Club for 47 years and is truly a Mecca for radio controlled modeling. Toledo's SeaGate Centre is right in the heart of town and is only a few blocks from the Toledo Museum of Art. The museum is really worth a visit, as is the Toledo zoo. Either, or both, an easy jaunt for your significant other while you "do" the models.

Why Toledo, you might wonder? Well! Look at it this way. Washington, St. Louis, New York City, Minneapolis and Atlanta are all within a twelve hour drive. While such exotic spots as Duluth, Fargo and the coastal cities of Virginia and the Carolinas are only a bit farther away. Over half of the population of the country is within a single day's drive of the show.

Prior to departing, I downloaded a list of exhibitors from the show's web site to discover over 250 listed. Unfortunately, from a boater's viewpoint, only about ten percent of those named were primarily (or even secondarily) boating oriented. Outfits such as Dumas, Midwest, Microglass, M.A.C.K., Robbe, Hobby Lobby, AMYA, Ships N' Things, MCD, RAM and Subtech come to mind. Others, such as Astro Flight, Mr. Nicad, Jomar, EMS were also of interest. Dick Walker's brother, Bob was nowhere to be found, even though I visited the Robart booth on Thursday evening and again on Friday morning. Although he was busy elsewhere, I was assured that he was planning on attending our Parade of Boats again this year.

Karl Kalb of Microglass continues to increase the size of his line of polyester glass hulls. Lots of generic tug hulls in his lineup. I picked up a copy of his new catalog with Ray Johnson's art work on the cover.

The USS Bluefish was the only new item on the Dumas table. Although it was a display model, I thought that the water tightness might be questionable and that the deck mounting was quite flimsy.

Dan Sinstead of MCD showed me his new Super Minicon and Ultra Minicon speed controls. These 10 amp and 20 amp units will handle up to 20 volts. He also showed me their Add-A-Switch unit which allows the switching of two circuits while not affecting the basic channel's function. Four functions operated by a simple two channel radio.

Since the Nautical Commander radio was conspicuous by its absence at the Ace booth, I asked if it was a "dead horse." I was assured that it would continue to be available. The two channel add-on, which makes the Commander a seven channel radio appeared to be another story. It has not been and is not available at this time. I got a shrug of the shoulders when I asked for a possible date for its debut.

Al Matava of Ships N' Things had a simulated boat configured to be operated by Robbe's F-14 Navy system. Twin proportional and reversible motors, lights, horn, engine sound, etc....all the bells and whistles individually controllable from the transmitter. And on 75mHz to boot! Perhaps we really don't need the Nautical Commander after all.

Decals: I found a company on the web called Bel Decal, www.beldecal.com, that offers water slide decal paper to make your own custom decals. I first tried their paper for Laser Jet/Color Copiers. This material was fast and easy, you could create a custom decal on your computer and go right from the printer/color copier to applying the decal to the model. There was no smudging and the edges were crisp and clean. The decal paper itself is so thin that the edges are barely noticeable when applied to the model. However, I could not find a suitable over coat to protect the decal, and with out an over coat the decal would eventually float off of the model in the water. Unfortunately, every over coat that I tried faded the ink.

I then ordered the decal paper for Ink Jet Printers. With this product, you design your decal on the computer, print it on the ink jet printer (I have an H-P 648C) and spray on a coat of Krylon Crystal Clear Acrylic (available from Michael's Craft Stores or most Wal Marts), let that dry for 18-24 hours, then cut the decal out and apply it to the model. Once dry on the model you can then overcoat it again with the Krylon to provide permanent protection. Again, the printing is of very high quality, nice crisp edges, no smudges, and true colors, and the edge of the decal is hardly noticeable. Dale Johnson tried this product on a higher quality printer than mine, and had poor

(actually unusable) results, so maybe the "jury's still out." I'll keep you posted.

The price of the paper is \$1.25 per 8 1/2 by 11 inch sheet plus \$5.00 shipping. It must be bought in quantities of 25, 50 or 100 sheets. I have ordered twice from this company and both deliveries arrived within 3 days.

At last, we can make custom decals at a reasonable price! (at least on my inexpensive printer) George Pfeifer





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Toledo, cont'd: Ralph Warner of RAM demonstrated his new smoke unit. It is about the size of a two channel receiver, contains a fan, and "burns" model railroad smoke juice. Ralph recommends Crest smoke fluid.

I spoke with member, Ed Rogala of Midwest Products. He introduced me to A. J. Broviak, his design engineer. A. J. will be attending our Parade in June. We might be able to have some input into future kits if we treat him well.

Paul Goldenberg of H.U.I. Robbe Schluter assured me that Robbe gear would be readily available in the U.S. A. I sprung for their new catalog, which has shrunk to 6 x 8 inches...it does, however, contain over 600 pages. Ten bucks, notwithstanding, there ain't no price list for the items in the catalog! Rats!

The show's venue is overwhelming. Assuming that the booths were ten feet long, the floor area covered by the show must approach two acres. Absolutely jammed with dealers and visitors. And, unlike some other shows, dealer sales are permitted. A swap shop on the second floor is huge, and would certainly justify a separate day to take it all in. I attended the show on Friday and had difficulty navigating the show floor because of the heavy crowds. I can not imagine what the show must be like on Saturday and Sunday, when most folks are off from work

Seminars are given throughout each day. Although most are devoted to aircraft, talks on composite materials, making fiberglass molds, or the use of cyano adhesives would be applicable to boats.

The competitive models on display were exceptional. Although I have drifted away from model aircraft over the past few years, I would be proud to have the least attractive model at the show on display in my home. The boats too, were terrific. My third place winner from 1994 would not stand a chance in today's show. Better, is putting it mildly. Seeing the boats was worth the price of admission (\$6 per day). Boating categories were: Military Scale, Pleasure, Competition (racing boat) and Working Vessel Unarmed. Something for everyone. Since models may be entered as late as noon on Saturday, Friday visitors, such as I, probably missed out on some of the "good stuff."

If you consider visiting the show in the future, planning ahead is a must. The Radisson and Toledo Tower hotels, right in the SeaGate Centre complex, are usually sold out months in advance. There is a Wyndham, about four blocks away, which might be easier to book. Motels on the outskirts of town are certainly cheaper...but then, you are confronted with the problem of parking your car at the show. The next Toledo R/C Expo will be held on April 5th, 6th & 7th, 2002.

On the way from Akron, prior to the Toledo show, we made a stop in Vermilion, Ohio to visit the Great Lakes Historical Society's, Inland Seas Maritime Museum. The museum is on a par with similar depositories in Duluth and Manitowoc, housing a large collection of plans and photographs of Great Lakes vessels. Models of boats (Great Lakes vessels are not called ships) abound. Numerous steam engines are on display. A grouping of smaller engines is powered by compressed air. The largest, a 13 foot tall, 1912 vintage, 500 horsepower example is on static display. A goodly number of half hulls, steam whistles, ship's (oops!) boat's instruments, paintings and lighthouse lenses are on view. A laker's wheelhouse jutting out toward Lake Erie is installed in such a manner as to give the distinct impression that you are aboard an actual boat. A relatively new wing devoted to the Edmund Fitzgerald might just be enough to lure our man Kirk over for a look. I even spotted a Ray Johnson print in the gift shop.

The museum's fifth annual Antique and Classic boat show, combined with their Youth Model Rendezvous on Saturday, June 23rd (9am - 5pm) might make a trip this summer doubly enjoyable. The museum is about 65 miles east of Toledo...or about 725 miles from the Twin Cities.

And, George...we did flip a salute to Knute as we passed South Bend! Both ways!
