

China, I went to a model ship exposition. As I was looking around, I saw a picture of one of the builders in a case, and saw him in the gallery. Eventually, I went up to speak to him, and, in my broken Chinese, we had a nice talk. It turns out that he was the designer of the western ships on display, which were actually from a local factory. He also made all of the Chinese ships on display, and told me about some details, like junks with masts mounted on the sides of the ships.

He pulled out a model of a river boat and explained to me why the aft end was not straight across. This boat is rowed from the back, with the oars pointing back (you waggle the oar side to side). The longer oar is for rowing and the shorter one is for steering.

While we were talking, a photographer of some sort wanted to take our picture. So, we stood in discussion while she took some shots. The next day, the English newspaper, the Shanghai Daily had a one page article on model ships, and sure enough, there is our picture! I gave master Xu the EMYC web site address, and told him to take a look at the wonderful models shown on the site.

It is great to discuss model boat building with people from different cultures. Even though our lifestyles are so completely different, we appreciate similar, unique things.

Batteries: Nickel-Metal Hydride (NiMH) cells by Ray O Vac, Energizer, Radio Shack and others are available at discount stores around town. Cost has come down to where they are definitely less costly for a single season of sailing than alkaline cells...if the boat is frequently used.

(note: Fred and the "every night" sailing group. Ed.)
A package of four NiMH cells can be found for as little as \$11. Purchase the 1600mAh versions. They are no more costly than the 1200s and will give 8+hours in the transmitter and 5+ hours in the boat.

For about \$25 for a charger and 4 cells, you get a set of batteries that will last for hundreds of uses, costing less than six sets of alkaline cells. Of course, you will need an additional eight cells for your transmitter.

The Eyes Have It: Very lightweight, bright yellow practice golf balls are available at Wal-Mart and other sporting goods stores. They are not the "whiffle" ball type, but a smooth and soft foam ball. They are sold in packages of four for about \$3.

Drill a 1/4 inch hole halfway through the ball and affix it to your transmitter antenna. Now! Not only have you marked your transmitter with the FCC required yellow "flag", but you have added a considerable safety factor in the event someone accidentally gets too close to the antenna with an unprotected eyeball


