G.Pfeifer recently operated his Harriet streetcar boat with the "real thing", the Minnehaha. He will show it again at the Lafayette Club at an event of the Minnetonka Garden Club. Commodore requested those in attendance to sign up for various duties at the Parade. New event at Parade. Kirk Brust's Titanic will be chased by an iceberg (a foam covered polo tug). Commodore introduced Kirk Brust who gave a 30 minute presentation on the construction of his latest scratch-built model, a 1937 European fishing trawler. He discussed building a mold for and casting a fiberglass hull, complete with plating. He also discussed making fiberglass parts having compound curves, making thin parts by vacuum forming using his kitchen oven and shop vac. He also explained how he weathered the finished boat using artist's oil paints. Finally, he used Testor's Dullcote overall.

Show-'n-Tell: D.Smith showed his Amati speedboat. A beautiful example of what a half dozen coats of polyester resin and 50 plus hours of sanding can do to a wooden surface. Don didn't recommend the kit. He noted that the mahogany veneer over plastic hull was rather unusual. The boat has yet to receive its running gear or radio

• Among the first "Germans" captured at Normandy were several Koreans. They had been





Steering regattas demonstrate the skills of the captain and his/her vessel while steering the model through a set course. The course will have both, buoys and channels and a layout of the course will be given to each captain the day of the event.

The scoring: Each participant starts with 100 points. There is a 5-point penalty for each buoy touched and a 10-point penalty for each buoy missed. The winner is the one left with the most points.

You can enter any type boat and as many as you want, but all number 1 boats will go first, then number 2, and so on. For example, if you have more than one boat

you want to use, first we will run all participant's first boat, then we start again with their second boat, etc. We will have a sign up sheet the day of the event for you to register your boats.

You can make modifications to help your steering. For example, you can make a bigger rudder, add a Kort nozzle or Z-drive, etc.

Come on over, bring your boats and have a good time!

Marblehead Regatta: I arrived at the park at 8:30AM (May 6th), put in the club dingy and set the buoys for the regatta. I placed a pair for the start/finish line just east of the "key" walkway. The wind was out of the SSE so the windward mark was placed close to the entrance to the north pond. A jibing mark was to the east of and in line with the start/finish line. Three leeward marks were placed to offer course changes without moving buoys.

The skipper's meeting was scheduled for 10:00AM, however there were no skippers. Bob Jester arrived about 10:20 and Paul Olsen a bit later. Mikio Kirihara strolled up at about 10:50 and Jerry Bell arrived shortly thereafter. The wind was forecast at 15 to 25 from the SE and showers possible. It was agreed that a heat or two should be run. About this time, Doug Person arrived with his Seawind, and it was time to sail. We ran two heats and had a short adjustment period. Racing was resumed with another 5 heats sailed for a total of seven.

After the Poker Run the week before, and in view of the forecast winds, I was surprised that anyone showed up. Results were as follows:

Fairwind Regatta: After a Sunday off for Mother's Day, the Fairwind Regatta arrived on May 20th. The weather was being predicted as cloudy, 60s with SE winds 10-15. I arrived at the pond at 8:00AM, put in the dinghy and set out the course buoys. By 9:30 I had the course established and was waiting for the skippers to arrive.

Nine Fairwinds arrived at the pond and 8 were sailed in actual heats. One Seawind was in attendance. The Seawind sailed in the same heats with the Fairwinds. In the skipper's meeting we

decided to sail 2 heats then have a 10 minute adjustment period.

The first heats were sailed and after the adjust period, six more heats were sailed. The wind was out of the SE with some gusting. There were also periods of extreme calm along the run to the jibing mark. Having sailed a total of 8 heats, another 10 minute adjust period was decided.

The next two heats were lengthened to add some variety and the 11th heat was also changed to a still longer course. This concluded the sailing as some of the skippers had to leave to attend other functions.

In addition to the regatta participants, Gary Anderson did the start sequence, Andy Valentine was the results recorder and George Pfeifer took a bunch of pictures. Thanks Gary, George and Andy.

In addition to the results below, an additional award was presented to Randy Chryst for sailing the Newest Fairwind.

Course clean-up was made easy because of the use of buoys with small weights. The course was clean and the dingy put away by 3:30PM.
