

# SAILING NEWS

#### **Iceboating at Waconia**

Saturday, February 1st was a great day for several reasons. Not only was it Chinese New Year, but we were invited to participate in Waconia's annual Winter Festival. The City of Waconia invited Tony Johnson to collect



some other R/C iceboaters together and give demonstrations on one of the city's outdoor ice rinks. With a total of about ten iceboats and twenty people, we all had a great time. Doug Campbell even brought an electric ducted fan model, which ran perfectly. Several of the models were from Tony and my company, several were scratchbuilt and one was a transformation from a land yacht kit. There was some interest from passers-by, but the spectator contingent was not as large as expected. As the wind picked up, the boats



started to move, and everyone got a chance to run one. These radio controlled iceboats really are a blast to run. They handle like real iceboats, so there are some differences between them

and sail boats. The two most significant differences relate to the wind. The first is that they tend to get into irons easier and once in irons, can't get out without a push or a significant wind shift. The second is that when overpowered, you must pull away from the wind to keep from tipping. This is due to the fact that if you are overpowered and tipping, pointing into the wind (as you do with a sailboat) will add more power to the sail so quickly that the boat will continue to spill. See you on the ice! -Alex Raupp



# MEETING NOTES - JANUARY


Club Meeting Notes January 21, 2003.
