#### **Nomination Of Officers:**

or, "Term Limits" Take Their Toll !

As you may be aware, the club bylaws dictate: "No person shall serve more than two consecutive one year terms as a director." This section (3.02) precludes at least half of the present board from seeking reelection for 1995.

The bylaws also specify that the "members shall elect successors for the directors" and "shall elect the Commodore."

Nomination forms were in club members hands by this time last year. Unfortunately, we have dropped the ball this time around.

To expedite the process, we will accept nominations for the various board positions, and separately, for that of Commodore at the

September 20th meeting.

Please, carefully consider the person or persons whom you would like to see leading our organization during the new year. We would like to have at least two members interested in the Commodore position to accept nomination, and five or more willing to serve as a board member. If your nominee is unable to attend the meeting, a signed note indicating his or her willingness to serve will be acceptable.

Those accepting nomination will be asked to submit a short written position statement on a form which will be distributed at the meeting, and return it prior to Oct.1st. These statements will be published, along with

ballots, in the October newsletter.

With prompt response on your part, we should be able to introduce the newly elected officers at the Dry Dock Party on Oct. 16th.

The term of office for those elected will run from Jan.1 through Dec.31, 1995.

#### General Membership Meeting, Aug.16th, 8:45 PM:

22 members in attendance.

At 9:08 PM, R. Peter distributed copies of his proposal to host the CR 914 Nationals at Centennial Lakes sometime during August 1995.

Approximately one half hour was spent explaning various aspects of the three page document. Discussion followed. When asked if it were true that there are only 30 CR 914 boats in the national

registry of the AMYA, Ralph replied that he thought that there were 38.

D. Kjelberg said that it was reasonable to expect only 2% of registered boats to attend. D. Kjellberg also spoke of the Marblehead event he had attended in Virginia at which club wives put on lunches, club members made room reservations and drove participants to and from hotels. Ralph assured the members that this would not be the case here. Concern was voiced as to club liability for such items as guaranteed hotel rooms or banquet reservations. Ralph once again assured the membership that there would be no cost to the club treasury for these or any other regatta expenditures.

M. Flannigan advised that in his experience, cost of necessary items such as trophies can be easily controlled, but that it is easy to over order on things such as tee shirts, and urged caution on such souvenirs.

Question was raised as to S. Rusk's contention that EMYC could not hold this event, since the CR 914 is not a club class boat. Ralph responded that that was Steve's opinion, however there is nothing to that effect in the club bylaws.

Ralph was asked if it were his intention to bring this matter to the membership for approval at this meeting. He replied in the affirmative, since the AMYA needs a reply by the first of September.

J. Sigvertson made a motion that the EMYC apply to the AMYA to be sanctioned as the host club for the CR 914 Nationals in 1995. Some discussion commenced. P. Olsen advised that a second to the motion was in order, not discussion. His remark was misinterpreted as a second, however M. Flannigan did. in fact second the motion. A show of hands revealed 11 members in favor, 8 not in favor, with 3 abstentions.

Motion carried. Adjourn: 9:55 PM

#### CR-914 **Nationals**

At the August membership meeting, the proposal for the EMYC to host the AMYA CR-914 Nationals was approved by a vote of the membership in attendance. Lester (Bud) Conners, the CR-914 Class Secretary, has been informed of our decision, and has passed this along to the AMYA. A mid August date is tentatively planned but will not be finalized until December when the AMYA will meet to schedule the Class Nationals.

Although the Regatta is nearly a year away, planning has already begun. Organizationally, I will act as Chairperson for overall coordination of the two Regatta committees that need to be formed. The Race committee. consisting of the Regatta Director and race officials, is responsible for all race related activities. The Event committee, consisting of three or four, is responsible for all non race related activities. Those with an interest in one of the two committies can contact me for more information.

First and foremost, planning for the Regatta will focus on the racing and social aspects of the event. However, with some additional work there may be an opportunity for the EMYC to earn a profit. Basically, a profit may be obtained from selling merchandise (cups, shirts, etc.), and corporate sponsorships (cash donations, reduced fees for services, etc.). In any event, this Regatta will be selfsustaining and there will be no cost to the EMYC.

#### CR-914 Miscellaneous Information by: Ralph Peter

Worth Marine, the national distributor of the AG 914 Cup Racer, has advised me that the wholesale price to the EMYC will be increased \$25 on October 1, from \$275 to \$300. This price includes the boat, two channel transmitter and receiver, rudder and sail servos. The higher torque, IC sail servo is now available for an additional \$25. I have also been advised that the Canadian distributor of the AG 914 will sell just the boat for \$220 (USD). They can be drop shipped from AG Industries to avoid the customs duty.


The AMYA CR-914 One Design Class Specifications are now finalized and became effective August 1, 1994. Copies are available for those interested.


EEEE / The Big Easy (TWO)

#### **Setting The Record Straight:**

To be truthfull as Commodore, I have not been as active as you the membership deserve. My first year as Commodore I found the Board and the club a very active and fun group to be around. This last year, I don't know what happened. Maybe it was just me and the constraints on my time, but the fun just didn't seem to be there. It started going down hill during the winter months when the Board and Officers met to get the year moving. It should have been fun and exciting looking to the next year. Instead we seemed to become bogged down on the details of what was going to happen. I think the Board forgot that we were there to look at the big picture and keep it fun for the members not just one group or what the Board wanted.

The Club has grown a great deal this last year but it seems that the EMYC is less unified than last year. When I first met to help form the EMYC, I had one goal in mind and that was to build a club that would remain a growing organization and survive longer than any one member. I don't feel that I have done as much as I should have to make this goal a reality. My last chance to move closer to the goal is to facilitate the election of Commodore and the Board. The bylaws state that the membership will elect a Commodore and the Board of Directors (4). The Commodore is a Board member and chairs the Board. Section 4.02 of the bylaws states "All officers, except the Commodore, shall be elected annually by the Board of Directors. I want it to be understood that the Board and Officers can be totally seperate from each other. The Board's job is to direct the officer's actions so that they fit the needs of the membership. The Officers duty is to fulfill the needs of the membership.

In the bylaws it states "No person shall serve more than two consecutive one year terms as a director". What this means to the membership is that Steve Rusk and Ralph Peter can't run for Commodore or the Board because we have both been Board members for two years. The other current Board members could run if they so wished.

The form the election is to take is not defined in the bylaws. The following has been proposed for this year's election. At the September meeting I will accept nominations for the Commodore's office and nominations for the Board of Directors. I have formed a calling committee to notify all members of the nomination process that will happen at the September meeting. Ballots will be enclosed in an early version of the October

newsletter. A committee of non-candidate members will tally the votes at the Dry Dock Party, and the results will be announced immediately.

At this point you can stop reading if you like, because you know all you need to know about the election process. From here on, are my personal feelings about how you should look at the election

process. I apologize if I offend anyone.

The election is the most important activity that you as a member participate in. The Commodore and the Board are the ones that set policy and elect officers. You the membership must insure that you are truly and fairly represented. The loudest or last voice heard is not always right! I feel many of the members sit back at the meetings and listen to a few voices and then feel that the few voices are the majority. You the membership must not just let this happen, you must speak and rally the real majority. This is not a Club for Officers or Board members, it is a club for the members. Only you the single member can make

the club work for you.

The Commodore and the Board must be made up of persons that have the EMYC's best interest at heart. Board members don't need to know how to sail, race, fix a radio, or even how to build a boat. Board Members must know how to be fair and level headed. They must not have such a focused interest that they only promote one area of the Club. The Vice Commodore should not be someone who only promotes electric power boats. The Treasurer should not have the goal to get the biggest bank account. The membership is best served by a Treasurer that makes sure that all activities are funded and that we don't go broke. The Rear Commodore position is probably served best by someone who can keep the Class Secretarys going. Not someone who races 7 days a week. The Rear Commodore along with the other officers are there to keep their area going while at the same time keep the perspective of the whole club's interests. To promote one interest at the cost of other interests is 180 degrees from what should be happening. If this happens remember the members can change Officers or Board members if they are not living up to the needs of the membership.

I feel that some of the least vocal of you would make the best Commodore and Board members. The way the last year has gone I feel that the EMYC needs new blood! We must have the members step forward and take charge of the Club. What is wrong if you don't know something and have to ask? What is wrong if it could have been better planned. If you do your best what more can the Club ask of you?



Penny Wise and not Pound Foolish either: How would you like to run your latest electric powered creation all day long and not worry about the receiver battery running down? How would you like to save that four ounces of receiver battery weight in your race boat? Both can be done easily by replacing the receiver pack with a simple Fixed-Voltage Regulator IC. Radio Shack part number 276-1770 costs \$1.19, and does the job. The addition of a Heat Sink, part number 276-1363 is probably a good idea if you desire to pull the full one ampere that the IC is rated for. Wiring is simple. Place the IC on your workbench with the #7805 lettering facing you (see illustation). Full Positive voltage (7.2 to 35v.) from your NiCd pack or lead acid battery goes to the left pin on the IC. Negative goes to the center pin, which is common to both the input and output. The right pin puts out a regulated, Positive, 5 volts, just right for your receiver and servos. You will need to buy a matching plug to fit your receiver from the hobby shop. This will be your most expensive purchase (about \$3.00). So, for an outlay of less than five bucks, you can save a quarter of a pound and never have to replace or recharge your receiver batteries! Jim Smith EMYC
