Dry Dock Party (Early): Park manager, Tom Shirley has advised us that the North pond will be unusable from prior to ice-out until sometime in July as a result of bridge construction over the pond at Parklawn Avenue. Water level will be lowered about five feet to allow the crew to work on footings. Although the South pond will be available throughout the entire period, water level may vary somewhat. (Ed. Note: As of 3/6/95, the project is two weeks behind schedule!)

Information Superhighway: For those so inclined, there is a small group of boat modelers on the Internet. The usenet group called "rec.models.scale" primarily in use by plastic modelers, is reported to have a small group of wooden boat builders on line. The group called "rec.models.rc" might also be of value. On CompuServe, "modelnet.forum" is where to look.

**Signal Your Intentions:** The Board of Directors has indicated that all radio transmitters must display a channel flag on the antenna for 1995 and beyond. Flags are supplied with all radios when purchased, and replacements are available at hobby shops for less than \$3. If you do not have a flagged transmitter, you will be asked to refrain from operating your radio until a flag is affixed. A word to the wise is sufficient. Do it now, don't claim ignorance in April!

Class Action: By action of the AMYA, the "East Coast 12 Meter" is no longer one of our three club sanctioned classes. Why? Because, the name has been changed to the "12 Meter Model Yacht Class".

Sail(planes) Anyone?: The Minnesota R/C Soaring Society will have an "open house" at the Minnesota Air National Guard Museum (at MSP International Airport) on Saturday, April 1st from 11 AM until 4 PM. If you have any interest in model gliders and/or full scale historical aircraft, this is an opportunity to do something about it. The museum has WWII vintage aircraft, early jets, and even an SR-71 Blackbird in inventory. The Soaring club will have models on display and members eager to talk about the joy of "silent flight". (Call for directions, I'll see you there, Ed.)

Board Meeting, 2/21/95: Meeting called to order by Commodore, Kjellberg at 6:30 PM. R.Peter distributed handout to board members in regard to "marketing" for '95. After discussion, it was decided to limit same to smaller posters with attached card racks to be placed in approximately 14 local hobby shops. R. Kiellberg requested that newsletter be mailed to Northern Breezes. Agreed, J.McCabe raised question of monthly calendar. Kjellberg stated that in addition to the thrice weekly regular boating schedule, the only items on the calendar are the Parade of Boats (scheduled for Sunday, June 12th) and the CR-914 National regatta (scheduled for Fri, Sat, Sun, August 11th, 12th and 13th). J.Bishop has agreed to head up the Parade once again this year. He is looking for a Co-Chairperson to assist him. R.Peter will manage the 914 Nationals, and has yet to form his various committees. J.Smith submitted membership renewal form to board. Advised to include same in newsletter as renewal date approaches. Smith was asked to make contact with the operators of the April Toy Boat Show to see if they would supply the club

with a table in exchange for advertising the show in the next two newsletters. Subject of transmitter frequency flags was brought up. Board advised that anyone attempting to operate radio gear without proper channel number flag (they come with all radio sets) will be refused permission to sail until a flag is displayed. The flag is a must for '95 and beyond! Commodore introduced Tom Shirley, Centennial Lakes park manager. Tom advised that construction of the Parklawn Ave. bridge is scheduled to commence immediately. Water level will be lowered about five feet on the north pond. It is anticipated that the south pond will be uneffected. Construction is anticipated to be finished by early July. With normal rainfall, both ponds should return to usable levels well prior to the 914 regatta.

Board meeting, - Adjourn: 7:10 PM Show 'n tell: J.McCabe gave a presentation on radios, channel expanders, speed controls and sound systems. Smith's, Phillip's and McCabe's tugs were on display. D.Campbell had the early stage of his ice-boat construction project on display as well.

Sail Winch Servos & Substitutes: Sail winch servos, which were a bit difficult to find not too long ago, seem to be having a rebirth. There are even a few unusual servos such as 'giants' and 'retract' (for landing gear on model aircraft) which may be just the ticket for your small to medium sized boat. Check these out:

Of course there are still the Dumas gear box units which put out up to 600 in./oz. of torque, and the M.A.C.K. 800 in./oz. arm style and 1200 in./oz. block and tackle rigs available. But, they are more for the likes of Marbleheads and 12-Ms, not for "Fairwind" and 36/600 class boats. I have used the Futaba S-125 in my Fairwind since 1988 without a hitch. Although its torque is considerably less than the Airtronics 94518, the Airtronics' torque comes at a high price... slow speed! Time/Travel numbers can be deceiving, since servos are usually rated at fractions of a second to travel 60°. For example, the Futaba S-125 is rated at .62 sec./ 60° but note is made in the catalog that maximum travel is 140°. It is probably reasonable to assume that the Futaba S3801 also travels 140°, but the catalog neglects to mention it! And, that baby is three times faster than the S-125, and almost eight times quicker than the Airtronics 94581! Prices shown are 'street', not suggested list. A couple of final cautions! The Large, Pro and Monster type of servos are mechanically restricted to about 120° of throw. And, although I have been assured otherwise, the retract types may not all operate proportionally. That is, they may not synchronize with transmitter stick position, but go fully from one limit to the other. It would be best to check on these two possibilities prior to purchase.






