Railings: On my recent river tow project, I thought that I would use something different for handrail posts than the same old rod material. I decided to use model railroad rails for posts. HO scale rail is commonly available in code 70, about 1/16" high and code 100, slightly under 1/8" in height in either brass or nickel silver. Smaller and larger sizes are also available but may be harder to find. The nickel rail that I used cost \$1.29 per three foot section.


I cut the rail into 2" pieces using an Exacto saw, (one caution, be prepared to throw the saw blade away when done as the nickel really tears up the teeth). Then I used a small round file to make a notch in the rail's end (the top of the post). The size of the notch should be a good fit for the handrail size that you expect to use. Drill one or more smaller holes down the post for a snug fit of any additional horizontal members. I used brass rod the same width as the post for the handrail and smaller rod for the lower bars. Solder the brass rod to the post tops. Thread the lower rods through the holes in the posts. These only have to be soldered at the end posts, saving a lot of tedious soldering. I am very pleased with the final effect and added relief that the rails provide.

Back Lighting: To realistically illuminate the instrument panel on your boat, first drill and finish the dash board. Install white faced instruments and clear plastic lenses in the panel. Then make a balsa "L" shape as shown in the drawing and cover both inside faces with adhesive backed chrome foil. Holes in the foil/balsa should line up with those instruments you wish to light. Place a miniature bulb behind each gauge and you're all set. Use a higher voltage bulb than your battery dictates (e.g. 12v. bulb with 7 cell, 8.4v. pack) and the bulb should last "forever".

Black instrument faces with white markings will work but are much harder to see. If you don't want to light up the boat's floorboards, the "L" shape can be built into a full box holding the lights. With this configuration, it's even more important to use a higher voltage (longer lived) bulb.

Edina Model Yacht Club

General Information:

Organization

The Edina Model Yacht Club (EMYC) was formed in 1991 as a non-profit, radio controlled model boat club. Membership consists of approximately eighty five enthusiasts of all ages, backgrounds, hobby-building skills and interests. The primary objective in the formation of the club was to create a relaxing and friendly environment for hobbyists in which to operate model boats. Although casual in nature, the EMYC is structured and well organized in its activities and group planned functions.

Location

The Centennial Lakes area in Edina, Minnesota serves as the home port for the EMYC and its on-water activities. This 1/3 mile long man-made lake winds its way through a 20 million dollar shopping and residential complex. The lake area is fully landscaped and is meticulously maintained by the City of Edina. It has become a favorite place for many to stroll, relax, play croquet, miniature golf, lawn bowling or just enjoy the outdoors.

Equipment

The club operates wind, electric and steam powered boats. No internal combustion powered boats are allowed on the lake in order to maintain the peaceful atmosphere. The club fleet consists of over forty Kyosho 'Fairwinds', a dozen Marblehead and several other types of sailboats, along with powered vessels ranging in size from less than one to over nine feet in length. Although some are designed and crafted from scratch, the majority are built from kits. Anything that floats is acceptable but the most unusual and interesting boats tend to be those created from original designs. The uniqueness of the hobby is a consequence of the radio control equipment, consisting of a hand-held transmitter that communicates with a receiver in the model. As controls are moved on the transmitter, commands are sent to the receiver, which then operates features such as propulsion motors, rudder, sail position, lights, horns, water pumps, etc. By using all of the radio frequencies available, over 30 models may be operated simultaneously.

Cost

The two major components are the boat itself, and the radio equipment. Prices of sail and electric powered boat kits start below \$100 and progress upward, depending on the size, quality of materials, number of parts, etc. The Kyosho 'Fairwind' model kit mentioned above is priced at approximately \$200, while minimum radio gear prices start in the neighborhood of fifty dollars. As with the kits, the cost increases as additional radio features and options are added. Also, as a model is constructed either from scratch or kit, extras such as glue, sandpaper, paint, etc. are needed. Taking these items into consideration, it will cost approximately \$325 and ten hours building time to get a complete and nicely finished 36" Kyosho 'Fairwind' sailboat model operating.

Membership

Membership in the EMYC enables one to participate in regular running activities as well as to become involved in monthly meetings, special events, and social gatherings. It also serves as a common base for the exchange of ideas, information, and shared interests. Membership dues of 20 dollars for adults, and 10 dollars for individuals under 18 years of age cover a one calendar year membership. A monthly (except December) newsletter keeps the membership informed of activities and events. Discounts on selected items are available to club members at several local hobby shops.

Events

A calendar of events is developed for each season, in addition to the regular running times (Tuesday and Thursday from 5:30 PM until after dark, and Sunday from 4:30 PM). A variety of activities such as building seminars, club regattas, public shows, demonstration events, swap shops, and an end of the season "Dry Dock" party are scheduled annually.
