Where's the Meeting: Centrum Building, July 21st. at 7:00PM. Bring a boat, we'll run about 8:00PM!

Sailboat Race: The morning of June 27th dawned clear and about 65°. By the 3:00PM start time of the All Class Sailboat Race the temperature had percolated up to 85°, skies had turned their usual ominous grey for this year with winds gusty and rain imminent. Ugly skies did not deter at least twenty members and guests from putting in an appearance, however. I counted nineteen boats...there were probably more, and was surprised to see 17 racing simultaneously. Only two frequency conflicts resulted in boats being unable to sail. One belonged to your editor...and he'd rather not race anyway!

Fairwinds, Seawinds, Victorias, Marbleheads, 914s, One Meters and a few other types that I could not identify all raced together. Comments ranged from "This was really great, we should do this at least once a month" to "These guys don't know what the h---they're doing". You can't please everyone, but I do believe that most of the participants had a good time.

"Official" racing ceased at 5:00PM, minutes before the skies opened up and dropped another half-inch of the wet stuff.

Rosefest: Fifteen members made it to Lake Bennet on July 1st. for the Rosefest celebration. Four tug, four sail, three speed, two commercial, and two pleasure boats entertained a small group of spectators. Weeds were under control this year, and the city provided us with a row boat (ably manned by Bob Jester) in the event that anyone got marooned. Since the weather was a bit threatening (what's new) spectator numbers were disappointing. Boats were on the water by 4:30...unfortunately, thunder, lightning and rain drove participants to their cars by 7:15.

More Building: When starting work on a new kit, get a grocery bag or a box and place all wood and plastic drop-off parts into it. I have been known to toss out a part or two still attached to the drop-off and this way I can retrieve it. It is sometimes necessary to reproduce a bad part and using the same wood is helpful. Discarded plastic trees come in handy to test paint color and compatibility. At the end of the project, sort through the drop-off pile and add the "good stuff" to the pile of junk you're keeping for the next project.

History: One hundred years ago this month (July 3, 1898), Joshua Slocum tied his rebuilt, century-old Chesapeake oyster sloop, "Spray", to the same cedar piling that held her when she was first launched. The landing was not noted in spite of the fact that Slocum and his small craft were the first to have sailed around the world alone. His voyage had started on April 24, 1895 with the aid of a compass, some old charts, a sextant, a hunk of lead on a line to measure depth and a windup tin clock for time. Slocum traveled 46,000 miles without autopilot, radio or locator beacons and was at sea several times for over 70 days between ports. After the voyage, Slocum lectured and wrote the book, "Sailing Alone Around the World" (still in print) to support himself. He was lost at sea in 1909 at the age of 65. (Note: "Spray"was 100 years old when Slocum started his trip) Dave Bros




