

Whoo!: No, that ain't no owl hootin'! It is a reminder to give some serious thought as to whom you would like to see running the club during the next alendar year. Sticky Stuff!: Although I am a dedicated West System epoxy fan, I recently came across an adhesive which you may find helpful. Bob Smith industries has a new rubber-toughened cyanoacrylate called IC-2000. It is supposed to form superior, shock resistant bonds on non-porous surfaces. Black in color, it has flexibility for bonding metals, fiberglass, rubber, etc. and may be worth a try for fastening motor mounts to glass hulls and similar applications. It may even be useful when gluing deck planking together, appearing as dark caulking between the timbers.

Membership Meeting, 8/17/99: Commodore called meeting to order at 7:10pm. 34 members and guests in attendance. Commodore announced free soda pop, left over from the Red Wing show. Commented on the fine turnout at the show. Crowd hindered somewhat by threatening weather and early rain on Saturday. Said that spectators could use a schedule of events at the show. It is anticipated that we will have an acceptable running area next year. J.McCabe distributed samples of the new Badger acrylic paints and Badger literature to one and all. J.Bishop spoke on the upcoming Lighthouse Night. He said that Scott Crosby, the Sousa band director is planning on floating 150 luminaries during the concert and expects 500-1000 spectators. There will be low altitude fireworks too. D.Gaston stated that he had very little response to his request in the August newsletter. If you want him to publish a source list, give him a call. Commodore introduced Andy Valentine who has agreed to administer our, soon to be new, web site. A show of hands indicated that well over 50% of those in attendance had web access. The goal is to have a master page with links to separate Sail, Fast Electric, Scale, etc. pages. A sale and/or auction page is planned for the future. Cost should be minimal, possibly free, with

an advertisement or two. The address "EMYC.Org" appears to be available for a nominal annual fee. A.Raupp said that Tony Johnson and Rod Crawford were off to California for the one meter Nationals. Alex reiterated that Fairwind Racing was still scheduled for alternate Thursday evenings at the North Pond. He said that you should think of it as a learning experience rather than cut-throat competition. J.Bishop gave a fifty minute presentation on simple wiring with an emphasis on running lights adequate to get members on the water during Lighthouse Night. Meeting adjourned at 8:40pm

Show-'n-Tell: J.Smith showed his Microglass Great Lakes Tug hull under construction. It will no longer be a 1:32 scale boat but rather 1:48. Everything up to the deck/bulwark level is finished. Superstructure is bare and incomplete. T.Splettstoeszer displayed his Lingberg mini tug in "EdnaG" colors. He ran it after the meeting since the pond was ripple free. T.Smalley gave a short review of his trip to Connecticut to the Sub-Committee annual gathering. K.Bottemiller showed his newly released Midwest Coast Guard Lifeboat kit. He figured that if anyone was planning on purchasing one, they might like to see one up close and personal prior to forking over their cash.

Chicago, Ho!: Rod Crawford trucked on down to the "windy city" over the July 31<sup>st</sup> – August 1<sup>st</sup> weekend to enter the Chicago R/CMYC's sail regatta. The event was similar to our mixed class gatherings in that it consisted of only two classes, Under-50" and Over-50" boats.

A scheduled 11:00AM start time on Saturday was intended to accommodate travelers, as was the 2:00PM

finish time on Sunday.

Mechanical problems blamed on strong winds claimed four dropouts on Saturday. Unfortunately, Rod's one meter was among them. His German "M" class boat fared considerably better however, taking one second place followed by seven first place finishes for the day. Six additional races were held in each class on Sunday. A "Santa Barbara" class boat edged out Rod's "M" boat in each heat, but did not accumulate enough points to prevail. Rod captured the Over-50" prize with a score of 24.25, 9.25 ahead of the second place finisher.

According to Rich Matt, of the Chicago club, "The Under/Over 50 thing served a great purpose in getting folks to come out and play, but in order to have some serious sail racing competition, we need to sail one of

the recognized AMYA classes".
